



PRESIDENTIAL REFLECTIONS

Board of Governors Sets Agenda for CLSA

I want to share with you two important items the Board of Governors (BOG) addressed at our January meeting: (1) Proposed constitutional changes affecting the term of office for consultants, treasurer and secretary and (2) a

Future Initiatives Project.

Over the years, members of the BOG have often expressed frustration with the rapid turnover of the membership. Almost half the Board is replaced each year.

Moreover, two years is a short period to get a handle on the

sometimes-complex operation that we call the CLSA. We propose that the terms of the consultants be extended to three years. In addition, we suggest staggering the terms so that only two consultants rotate off the BOG every two years. Finally, we propose that the treasurer and secretary serve for three years with their terms ending in different years.

We do not see the need to recommend a change in the term of office for the President since that person already serves on the BOG for three years, the first as Vice-President/President Elect, a year as President, and the third as Past President.

It is the thought of the BOG that this reconfigured Board would be more effective and efficient. This will give us more conti-

nunity and make it easier for the Board to monitor and direct the activities of committees and projects.

If the membership approves these changes in 2006, they would be reflected in the elections of 2007.

If you wish to comment on these proposals please contact me or any member of the Board of Governors.

The second important decision we made has to do with the action of an earlier Board to address the issue of Planning. In 2004 the BOG established

a Planning Task Force (earlier named a Strategic Planning Task Force). It was given a four part mandate

(1) address the staffing needs of the Executive Coordinator's Office (2)

Revise the Handbook

of the Board of Governors (3) Review the Publications function of CLSA and (4) Report to the BOG any other issues concerning planning for the CLSA.

The first three have been addressed or are currently in process. In order to fulfill the fourth and final part of the mandate, I have established a Future Initiatives Project. Sister Sharon Euart, RSM, immediate Past President, will chair the project. Four or five past presidents will join her.

The Project is to do two things: (1) review the seven stated purposes of our Society contained in Article II of the CLSA Constitution and (2) propose

- With respect to canon 517, §2, CARA points out that “over the last decade, the number of Catholic parishes in the United States entrusted to deacons, religious sisters and brothers, and other lay persons has grown from 268 in 1993 to 566 in 2004.” CARA “identified 36 unique job titles for these ministers with the most common being Pastoral Administrator, Administrator, Parish Life Coordinator, and Pastoral Coordinator.” CARA also notes that “while the share of parishes entrusted to religious sisters has declined from 65% in 1993 to 43% in 2004, 26% of parishes were entrusted to deacons and another 26 percent to lay men and women. Five percent were entrusted to religious brothers. actions and strategies for the revitalization of the Society in light of these stated purposes for the next three to five years.

The Future Initiatives Project will give a preliminary report to the Board in April. Its progress will be shared with the membership through the Committee Report book distributed at the 2006 convention. A final report is anticipated in 2007

On another matter, the BOG reviewed a response from the Holy See relative to the resolution passed at our 2006 convention to try to secure the licensing agreement from the Holy See to publish a document, in parallel text format, having the articles of *Dignitas Connubii* on one side with the referenced canons of the 1983 CIC on the other. Unfortunately, the response from the Holy See does not make it feasible to proceed with this project.

The good news is that Father Jerry Serba is making available his personal, unofficial, document, which has the parallel text of *Dignitas Connubii* and the Code. It will be on his parish’s website, www.sacredheartcathedral.org. Click on the words “Dignitas Connubii” and it will appear in an Adobe Reader format. Thanks, Jerry.

Finally, I asked Sister Sharon Euart, RSM, immediate Past President, to represent the CLSA at the Memorial Mass for Rev. Monsignor Frederick McManus that was held at the Catholic University of America on January 31, 2006. In 1973 Monsignor was the first recipient of the Role of Law Award. He served the Church in so many ways on so many levels. He was a gift to our Society. May he rest in the peace of the Lord. ▼

diocese of San Francisco on May 21, 1977. From 1977 to 1981 he served as Associate Pastor of Holy Name Church in San Francisco and then St. Pius Church in Redwood City. From 1981 to 1982 he served as a member of the Archdiocesan marriage tribunal before undertaking canon law studies at the Pontifical College of St Thomas in Rome where he earned his JCL in 1984 and his JCD in 1986. A member of the Canon Law Society of America since 1982, the new bishop was elected to the society's board of governors in October 1992 and then president in 1995. In 1992 he co-edited with Msgr. Nevin J. Klinger, the *Clergy Procedural Handbook*, published by the Canon Law Society of America. The members of the Canon Law Society of America offer Bishop Calvo and the people of God in the Diocese of Reno, Nevada, our congratulations and best wishes.

- **Msgr. James F. Checchio**, 39-year-old priest of Camden, NJ, has been named Rector of the Pontifical North American College in Rome. 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Canon Law, Oblate School of Theology, San Antonio, 1999-2001, and Judicial Vicar, Diocese of Austin, 1998-2001. Msgr. Jenkins earned a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology and a Master of Arts in Philosophy at the University of Dallas in Irving, Texas, a Baccalaureate in Sacred Theology (S.T.B.) and a Licentiate in Sacred Theology (S.T.L.) at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, and a Licentiate in Canon Law (J.C.L.) at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. He has been Associate Professor of Canon Law at Catholic University since 2001. Msgr. Jenkins is Associate Editor of *The Jurist*, a Judge on the Canadian Appeal Tribunal for the Dioceses of Canada, and Postulator for the Cause of Canonization of Mary Virginia Merrick, a Washington, D.C. woman who founded the Christ Child Society to assist needy children. He is a member of the Canon Law Society of America, the Canon Law Society of Canada, the Canon Law Society of Great Britain and Ireland, the Canon Law Society of Australia and New Zealand, the International Society of Canon Lawyers, and the *Consociatio Internationalis Studio Iuris Canonici Promovendo* (International Society for the Promotion of the Study of Canon Law). 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IN MEMORIAM

Msgr. Frederick R. McManus, a noted canon lawyer, teacher, author and central figure in U.S. liturgical reforms after the Second Vatican Council, died at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston Nov. 27 of complications following a severe fall in October. He was 82. His funeral was to be celebrated Dec. 2 at St. Joseph Church in Lynn, Mass., his childhood family parish, followed by burial at St. Joseph Cemetery. An expert in liturgy who was president of the Liturgical Conference in the United States 1959-62 and 1964-65, Msgr. McManus was appointed to Vatican II's Liturgy Commission and was the primary drafter of portions of the council's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy. After the council he played a major role in implementing liturgical renewal.

Monsignor McManus was a longtime member of the Canon Law Society of America. He earned his JCD degree from The Catholic University of America in 1954. Monsignor served on the society's Board of Governors (1968-1969) and he received the CLSA's Role of Law Award in 1973. His academic career at the university was illustrious. Monsignor served as Academic Vice President, Professor of Canon law, Consultant, Director of the Secretariat, NCCB Committee on Liturgy (1965-1975), Editor of *The Jurist* from 1959 until his retirement and a consultant for *Consilium* for the Implementation of the Constitution on the Liturgy from 1964-1969. Always a

gentleman and a scholar, Monsignor remains a cherished part of many whose education and canonical formation he guided at The Catholic University of America.

The University of Notre Dame announced the death of the **Reverend John F. Lahey, CSC**, on January 28, 2006 at age 62. Born in La Porte, Indiana, he entered the Holy Cross Community and made his final vows in December of 1969 before being ordained to the priesthood on April 4, 1970. Over the years he taught at Stonehill College in Massachusetts, Vanderbilt and Andover-Newton Theological School as well as Notre Dame University. Father John earned his JCD from the Catholic University of America in 1988. He taught canon law for many years at the University of Notre Dame and served as Superior and Rector of Moreau Seminary until he first took ill in 1998. He suffered from diabetes which resulted in the loss of one leg in 1998 and the loss of his eyesight shortly thereafter. His last seven years were most difficult and he had not kept in communication with many people. His friends describe him as a remarkably gifted man. He was a master story-teller, mimic, and humorist. He will be greatly missed by his confreres and family. His funeral mass was February 1, 2006 at the Basilica of the Sacred Heart, Notre Dame, with burial in the community cemetery at Notre Dame. ▼

CLSA Publications – Our Publishing Company

This October, the Canon Law Society will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of its decision to make education the highest CLSA priority. Back in Chicago, Illinois, on October of 1981 at the Palmer House Hotel, the membership endorsed the resolution that “*The Canon Law Society of America assigns the highest priority to the canonical education of its membership and the People of God, especially those who serve in positions of leadership. Thus, the Society commits itself to assess and evaluate all its projects and activities in the light of this priority, although not necessarily to the neglect of important tasks, and directs its committees and officers to focus their work on the Society with this priority in view.*”

CLSA Publications became one of the foremost ways in which the society of almost 2000 members continues to implement this priority. In the last twenty-five years, the Society has published through CLSA Publications, two English translations of the *Code of Canon Law* and two English translations of the *Code of Canons of the Eastern Churches* as well as collaborated with Paulist Press and others to publish commentaries, handbooks, serials such as *Roman Replies and CLSA Advisory Opinions* as well as a number of other hard cover and paperback books on canonical topics such as *CLSA Proceedings*. Without CLSA publications, many of these texts would never have been produced and disseminated into the hands of canonists and those who labor in leadership positions in the Catholic community. Canonical topics are too narrow and focused for general readership and the numbers of texts needing to be printed is too small to make CLSA Publications a money making publishing company.

Take a look at our current *2005-2006 CLSA Publications Catalog* which comes as an insert with this edition of the CLSA Newsletter. Our current listing of texts still in print and available to interested readers remains impressive.

Consistently over the last ten years, the Board of Governors has attempted to publish canonical texts at a price which was affordable to the budgets of men and women who work in church institutions which often have limited resources. For the most part, the board’s directives on publication efforts have been maintained despite the continually rising costs of paper, ink, postage rates, and distribution needs.

Approximately three to four hundred members and friends of the CLSA take advantage of pre-publication offers for new texts such as our more recent publications, the *Canon Law Digest Index*, *Advisory Opinions III*, and *Consecrated Life: Cases, Commentary, Documents, Readings*. The pre-publication offers help the society meet production and initial distribution costs at a savings to those who participate. Many more members take advantage of their membership status to order and disseminate CLSA texts at their various workshops and educational programs. The Society, for example, has been able to make its 1999 English translation of the *Code of Canon Law* available to many interested

readers throughout both the United States and many parts of the English speaking world.

Today’s members of the CLSA remain the “sons and daughters” of those members in 1981 who charted us to canonical education as our highest priority. Without their insight and direction we would not have the canonical resources so close at hand for our use in chanceries, tribunals, classrooms, and the resolution of so many church difficulties.

There are challenges for tomorrow. Quality control is but one of many publication issues which require careful attention and constant monitoring. Will electronic publication or “publication upon demand” be the “wave of the future”? How will the society maintain the economical production of canonical materials at a time when costs continue to move upward? The CLSA has a number of committees and individuals working on many of these questions. We will find solutions to problems as they arise because our mandate is clear and the members support the society’s publication efforts. ▼

Responsibilities include teaching courses in canon law, directing licentiate theses and doctoral dissertations, continuing research and publication, and service to the University and the Church through appropriate campus activities and consultations.

Qualifications include a doctorate in canon law (J.C.D.), demonstrated

research ability (usually through publications), teaching experience and experience in the practice of canon law. Competence in civil law is helpful. Fields of study to be taught are negotiable. Salary is negotiable based on professional experience and qualifications.
